### 3. Nature of the organization.

The WWAGS is a nonprofit making, Non Governmental State Level Organization working for the weaker section of the rural and urban especially poor women and children in the State of Manipur and deliver its activities to the whole North Eastern States as well as the Northern India.

Integrated sustainable Development programmes through community based social transformation and health care - MCH-HIV/Aids, Safe drinking water supply & Sanitation, Health & Hygiene, eradication of illiterates and avail them of teaching learning materials, ophthalmology care, building up family resources, formation of SHGs, affordable alternative energy resources, capacitation of training to create new local leadership and enhance the levels of quality analysis and management of local issues in remotest- rural & semi urban areas.

- 4.1. WWAGS already initiated **Jan Shikshan Sansthan (JSS), Institute of Peoples Education**, Thoubal District in the year 2002, first of its kind in the State of Manipur. Under this institute, more than 286 vocational trades have already been introduced in Thoubal District and were trained 34200 numbers of trainees in different vocational trades so far. In addition to this for the sustainable livelihood promotion various EDP also incorporated. WWAGS also initiated JSS Chandel District in the year 2021. The both JSS i.e. Thoubal and Chandel is under Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship funded 100% under this Skill India Mission.

## 9. 9.1 Background of the Organization:

✦ **WANGJING WOMEN AND GIRLS SOCIETY (WWAGS)**, (Rural Development Services) is an organisation formed on the 22nd Dec. 1958. The idea of existence of WWAGS came in the mind of the young and educated men and women after the 2nd World War which affected a lot of people. A lot of people died unnaturally due to the lack of food and using open tank water for drinkable purposes since they were not aware the importance of hygiene. Seeing such conditions, some local volunteers started working in the area of development and the WWAGS cooperated with a single mind in order to fulfill their aims since the working was started for the people in the rural in accessible areas particularly women and girls of the weaker section of the society.

The WWAGS is a non-profit making, non-political, non-religious organisation and the members having the dedicated spirit in the field of public help, sticking to secularism on true democratic ground started working. The WWAGS emphasized on the income generating programmes and social upliftment of the women and girls in the rural areas particularly the destitute and aged women. Such women are provided food, vitamins, fruits and essential commodities in cooperation with the local organisations, associations, clubs and Mahila Mandals. Regarding income generating programme, WWAGS took up programmes both in valley and hills. The WWAGS has completed some projects like income generating programme, social forestry, Adult Education, Health and Sanitation and benefited a large no. of women, men and girls in Thoubal and Chandel District. In the hill areas, income generating programmes such as Piggery, Weaving, Social Forestry, Banana Plantation, Pineapple Plantation etc. were taken up so that they can meet their financial needs. With the aim of self employment, increasing employment opportunities for rural women living below the poverty line by upgrading and strengthening their activities WWAGS benefited men and women in the rural areas.

In recognition of its outstanding contribution in the field of Adult Education with the aims of literacy for all in India by 2000 A.D., WWAGS was honored with the **UNESCO - National Literacy Mission (NLM) Award 1998**, for outstanding contribution in the field of Adult Literacy on the 4th Feb. 1999 at New Delhi, Chaired by former Minister of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India and Prof. Federico Mayor, Director General, UNESCO, France and also WWAGS was honored the **State Best Volunteer**

**Award 2004** by the All Manipur NGOs Forum, Manipur. The WWAGS is a State Level Organization working particularly in the state of Manipur but for the last 7 years it has been working in 8 states of North Eastern Region of India in the fields of North East India Zonal Water Partnership (NEIZWP) as a Convener under Global Water Partnership and India Water Partnership.

At present WWAGS is working with 3 Central Ministries Projects namely

**1. Senior Citizen Home for Older Women (SCHOW)** at 7 villages for 175 beneficiary at 6 District (Thoubal, Kakching, Bishnupur Jiribam, Pherzawl and Noney Districts). Since 1998 all the Centre's were DCC under Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, GOI, New Delhi, now they were converted to SCHOW from 1<sup>st</sup> March 2018.

**2. STEP Project** covering 13 villages for 700 women beneficiary at Two Blocks of Thoubal District and 40 Creche Centre covering 1000 children at Thoubal District under Ministry of Women and Child Development, GOI.

**3. Agro Textile Project** for poor farmers at Thoubal District target to cover 700 beneficiaries under SASMIRA Mumbai, Ministry of Textile, GOI.

**4. Urban Livelihood Promotion**, 2 (two) ULB are in engaged with the organization for their Urban Livelihood Promotion under National Urban Livelihoods Mission for the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation G.o.I.

**5. Start-Up Village entrepreneurship Programme (SVEP)**, targeted 1800 enterprises for the Keirao Block of Imphal East District, Manipur is in execution in profound goal since 28<sup>th</sup> November 2019 under the National Rural Livelihood

Mission, MoRD G.o.I. The Start-Up Village Entrepreneurship Program (SVEP) is a sub component of Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana – National Rural Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NRLM) of the Ministry of Rural Development. SVEP aims to support entrepreneurs in rural areas to set up local enterprises.

### **Vision and Scope**

The long term vision of the SVEP is to provide support for start-up to 1 crore village enterprises and provide direct employment to 2 crore people. The SVEP shall help the rural poor come out of poverty by helping them set up enterprises and provide support till the enterprises stabilize. The programmatic intervention will address all three missing ecosystems – Knowledge, advisory and finance ecosystems.

### **OBJECTIVES**

The overall objective of SVEP is to implement the Government's efforts to stimulate economic growth and reduce poverty and unemployment in the villages by helping start and support rural enterprises.

Implementation of SVEP shall be managed by NRLM through the State Rural Livelihood Missions and National Resource Organisation (NRO) or Project Implementation Agency (PIA) empanelled by Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD).
